We are all happy to have students back in the classroom. The ALSO staff team has been doing their best to support students and stay connected, whether we are in the classroom or online.

Connection is so important for all of us. True connection, the feeling that you have someone's full attention and that they *see* you, is vital for each of our well-being. Giving our full attention to our students is something we value highly.



I no longer have students dropping into my office to chat for 30 or 40 minutes at a time. Almost half of my day used to be spent giving my full attention to a number of our students. It is not that I had many or any pearls of wisdom to offer. Quite the opposite. Most times I wouldn't really speak at all, other than to let the person know I heard them, I was happy to listen, and I thought they had in themselves what was needed to overcome whatever challenge they were facing. In this continued time of social distancing and limited personal connection, each small kindness takes on new layered meaning. In each small kindness is the message, *I see you*.

I hope that in the next year, we will be able to continue supporting students in this way and hope that I can count on the generosity of donors and our community to help make that happen. I am looking forward to having students drop into my office again. Until then, we will all continue to do our best to let our students know they are seen and heard. And we will continue to do that for each other.

Seven years ago, a repetitive strain injury to her wrists and shoulders forced Wendy to give up hairstyling, a career she loved deeply. With a learning disability and poor reading and writing skills, the prospect of starting over in a new job was daunting to say the least. She knew that in order to move forward she would need to make some changes.



Wendy was an ALSO student

for several years. We had the privilege of watching her gain confidence and succeed in her goal of achieving her high school diploma. As we developed our relationship with Wendy, she became more comfortable in the classroom. She developed a stronger voice for herself in both her writing and personally. She laughed easily and always had a kind word for staff and students. At the age of 63, she received her high school diploma. Wendy went on to succeed in an employment training program in landscaping.

I am always impressed by the dedication and compassion of our ALSO teachers. They have a genuine love of teaching. The work they do can be challenging. They rise to this challenge with each new day, giving their best to the students we serve at ALSO.

This Fall we are asking for support with our Adult Upgrading Program.

We very gratefully receive funding from the Ministry of Labour, Training and Skills Development, allowing us to offer our Adult Upgrading Program. (THANK YOU). This funding covers most, but not all, of what it costs to run our program.



At ALSO we work with adults who are not comfortable working in a mainstream classroom. They often have been welcomed out of other programs. ALSO is chosen because we have a reputation in the Ottawa community for being flexible, patient and highly supportive.

When adults have not had positive school experiences earlier in life, the prospect of returning to school can be overwhelming and very triggering. There is often shame attached to the return to school. For some, these feelings stop them from ever achieving their goals. For others, having the courage to reach out and explore returning to school is life changing. It is very important that the program they engage with understands the potential barriers each person may face and is able to meet each person where they are, in order for them to begin to make changes, commit to learning, and imagine a different future for themselves.

We are privileged to be a part of each student's journey, as the idea that everyone deserves the opportunity to learn and participate more fully in both the community and the economy takes hold and becomes real.

Our goal is to raise \$5000 to provide support to over 100 adults each year and we are confident we can make this happen.
